A History of the Indians of the United States. by Angie Debo. In depth historical survey of relations between the European intruders and native Americans from discovery to the present.

Conspiracy of Fools. by Kurt Eichenwald. Riveting history of the rise and fall of Enron and the players involved in it.

The Clinton Riddle: Perspectives on the 42nd President edited by three academics at the University of Arkansas. Inter-disciplinary assessment of the 8 years of the Clinton administration, delving into character and policy.

The Cultural Creatives: How 50 Million People are Changing the World. by Paul H. Ray. Drawing on 13 years of survey research, this text explains how views of what's important are changing and a new "middle" is emerging between right and left.

A Concise History of the World by J.M. Roberts. A readable storehouse of facts portraying the ultimate big picture.

The Search for the Panchen Lama by Isabel Hilton. Fascinating book about Tibetan culture and relationship with China.

A History of Civilizations by Fernand Braudel. A lengthy, meaty and often indigestible survey of contemporary civilations.

The Fatal Shore by Robert Hughes. Fascinating history of the convict transportations to Australia

From Columbus to Castro: The History of the Caribbean by Eric Williams. Dense and informative, though not an easy read.

Stupid White Men by Michael Moore. Read it, even if painful and sometimes annoying.

Vietnam, a History by Stanley Karnow. Excellent history of Vietnam, including the US war.

Miracle in Philadelphia: The Story of the Constitutional Convention, May-September, 1787 by Catherine Drinker Bowen. Well done and instructive.

The Coming Anarchy: Shattering the Dreams of the Post Cold War by Robert T. Kaplan. Thought provoking series of essays.

The Rise and Fall of the Third Reich by William Shirer. Outstanding history of the rise and fall of Hitler.

Eyewitness to Power by David Gergen. Interesting and easy read from a Republican point of view.

Power and Terror by Noam Chomsky. Excellent information and insight, sometimes hard to read.

The Tunnels of CuChi by Tom Mangold and John Penycate. Well written and fascinating book about the Vietnam war, viewed from both sides.

Eco-Economy: Building an Economy for the Earth by Lester R. Brown A vision of an environmentally sustainable economy along with a roadmap on how to get from here to there.

When Corporations Rule the World by David C. Korten (2nd Edition) A searing indictment of an unjust international economic order.

The New Rulers of the World by John Pilger. A collection of recent essays on power, its secrets and illusions, that illuminates the nature of modern imperialism.

United Nations; The First Fifty Years by Stanley Meisler. The story of the UN, its promise and problems during its first half century.

Arab and Jew; Wounded Spirits in a Promised Land by David Shipler. A monumental work that delves into the origins of the prejudices that have been intensified by war, terrorism, and nationalism.
